Marsala is "sensual and bold" and a inviting "daringly tone that nurtures...exuding confidence and stability while feeding the body, mind, and soul," according to Pantone. "Much like the fortified wine that gives Marsala its name, this robust shade incorporates the warmth and richness of a tastefully fulfilling meal, while its grounding red-brown roots point to a sophisticated, natural earthiness," continues Pantone.

1. Pair Marsala with "timeless and unobtrusive Glacier Gray," suggests Pantone.

2. Give Marsala attire a yellow jewel for an analogous color effect.
